# **BREAKOUT GROUP REPORTS**

Self-assigned groups reviewed the SWOT, vision, and list of ideas and were asked to present about five high-level directions related to their theme

# **Transportation Group**

Fit and well seniors:

- Improve infrastructure for active transit signs, lighting, bike paths, scooter paths, washrooms, benches, connectivity, shade
- · Transit that draws on Complete Street Model policy and WHO checklist
- Make transit more affordable
- Reduce transit "stigma"

Those requiring assistance with ADL:

- Accessible vehicles
- Provide shuttle system to high need locations
- Volunteer mentoring to help people learn transit system
- Include caregivers transportation needs

Those requiring 24 hour care:

- Make transportation affordable for individuals and caregivers
- Improve transportation to get to seniors to provide 24 hour care

# Housing Group

- Provide more rent geared to income residences
- More small scale senior housing in various municipalities
- More funding for granny suites
- Make existing homes safer through inspections and follow-up
- Provide assistance with house maintenance and repairs

# Social/Cultural/Recreation/Education Group

- Coordinate programming, education, recreation and cultural activities
- Offer education topics on topics such as social issues, computer literacy, fitness, pharmaceuticals and other areas seniors want to learn or teach
- Provide a greater variety of recreation options including indoor pools and walking trails
- Offer day programs through libraries and schools
- Raise awareness of programs available

# Health Group

- Improve communication on all levels of care
- Increase health promotion/chronic disease management
- Increase dementia care
- Address caregivers health/support
- Provide integrated geriatric specialized services
- Evaluation and quality assurance

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# BREAKOUT GROUP REPORTS (Cont'd)

## **Diversity/Barriers Group**

Include francophones, Afro Canadians, newcomers, refugees, people with disabilities, non Christians, Aboriginals and LGBT individuals in the following strategies:

- Provide community education on diversity issues through newspapers, libraries, senior centres, etc.
- Increase engagement of different cultures at community events such as farmers markets, festivals, Canal days
- Provide training to health professionals, businesses, housing providers and schools supported with tool kits
- Leverage existing diversity groups and resources

# Leadership and Profile Group

- Increase business engagement and involvement with age friendly issues
- Engage politicians, churches, faith leaders, schools and agencies in bringing message out to the public utilizing leaders in each group
- Reintroduce the census to maximize funds and address differences of each community and duplication of services
- Engage service clubs and youth and ensure all leaders/advocates listed in community guides are involved
- Develop an easy to use marketing strategy all clubs could use in a common way but identifiable with each community

# **Community Development and Engagement Group**

- Asset based community building identify talents and experience of seniors and encourage them to participate and contribute to community
- Leverage the aging strategy to produce buy-in
- Respect and celebrate local history by presenting lives and stories of seniors
- Create multiple intergenerational collaborations to spark interest of seniors
- Integrate frail seniors, adult developmentally disabled and those with disabilities and mental health issues into active participation
- Actively encourage voter turnout
- Insist on regular engagement of municipal representatives with community
- Run more community forums, including frail elderly in LTC facilities
- Hold intercultural events and celebrations
- Be more imaginative in planning for a diverse population

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# BREAKOUT GROUP REPORTS (Cont'd)

## **Resources and Sustainability Group**

An economic strategy is required to move forward with identified issues recognizing there is no new money and a need to prioritize existing funds.

- Foster cross collaboration of existing resources understanding of existing services and mandates; increased collaboration of volunteer services; partnership agreements; linkages between services; increased consumer awareness; organization of services according to need
- Improve system navigation coordination of care and service; collaborative approach to enhance coordination, continuity and consistency; better information sharing while respecting privacy of personal information; mandated cost-benefit analysis
- Be proactive vs. reactive support development of National Dementia Strategy and National Seniors Strategy; increase respite; national strategy to develop hospice and palliative care
- Link data to services funding allocation in response to statistical data that is accurate and available; responsible client-centred decision making re: shifting resources
- Acknowledge the voice of the client to increase understanding
